Since 2018, the foundation has granted more than \$82,700 for local causes. The FCCF board has designed the 396 Foundation Club campaign to build an endowment that will fund community efforts for years to come. In addition to funding, the FCCF seeks ways to increase community engagement in creating a strong community.
